The conflict in Yemen, which began in 2014, was the source of widespread violations of international humanitarian and human rights law. As a number of ATT States Parties were major arms exporters to the warring parties, the war was the first major test of compliance with the ATT.

What have been the lessons learnt for campaigners which advocated against arms transfers to the warring parties involved in the Yemen conflict? And what is happening now in Yemen?

Since the Yemen conflict, what key developments—legal, political, or normative—now influence decisions around authorising arms transfers? For example, are ATT States Parties now taking into account the recipient state's commitment to the Political Declaration on the Use of Explosive Weapons in Populated Areas signed in 2022 when making transfer decisions? Are the parts and components that comprise major systems subject to greater oversight? Has there been greater scrutiny on the threat of diversion? What other recent developments are relevant in this context?

Finally, what opportunities and lessons can be drawn from the Yemen experience for organisations currently challenging arms transfers in **other ongoing conflicts**?
